Military May Halt Payments Over MRP

WASHINGTON — The Pentagon is threatening to stop certain payments to military contractors whose computerized material-requirements-planning systems do not comply with a newly defined set of standards.

More than 300 military contractors are expected to be affected by the standards, which

sprang from congressional hearings into Defense Contract Audit Agency accusations that contractors have collected more than \$1 billion in unwarranted fees in recent years by using MRP systems to double bill, inflate prices and commingle inventories.

The standards, which list key elements needed for material

management and accounting systems, are intended to head off action on Capitol Hill requiring certification of MRP systems. The standards resulted from negotiations between Defense Department auditors and industry representatives.

After receiving the standards and compliance order from the Pentagon, congres-

sional officials said last week they would delay action on bill pending in the House (see Manufacturing Week, Oct. 26 at least until March 1 when the Government Accounting Office will submit a review of the standards and contracto compliance.


List Of Nine Standards

The order requires the Pentagon's administrative contracting officers to work with the DCAA in approving contractor demonstrations of their compliance with a list of nine standards covering such elements as audit trails, record accuracy, and common inventory accounts.
